- **Hiking in Heat**

- ⇒ Know your limitations. The Preserve contains 195 miles of trails. Learn trail distances and difficulty, major trail intersections and Preserve access points. It's a great idea to grab one of our free maps, which are available at our trail heads.
- ⇒ Hydrate: begin day prior to hike/exercise, hour before hike, during and after. Bring plenty of water. The desert environment is very dry and hot. Don't let yourself become dehydrated.
- ⇒ Wear proper clothing, lightweight and light color. Protect your head with a hat. Wear appropriate shoes. Many of the mountain area trails are uneven and rocky.
- ⇒ Wear sunblock. The sun is intense.
- ⇒ Take a working cell phone with a fully charged battery. Cell phone access is available in most of the Preserve, though you may have to walk to a higher elevation to get a signal.
- ⇒ Hike with a buddy.
- ⇒ Always tell someone where you are hiking and when you to plan to return.
- ⇒ While in the Preserve, you will see numbered trail markers that can help rescuers find you in an emergency. Pay attention to them as you hike or bike by.

Bellasera in the Rear View Mirror

A look back in Bellasera history. This may bring back memories for long-time residents and be of interest to those not living in our community 5 & 10 years ago. Clips from past newsletters follow.

Bellasera Neighborhood News, June 2008, 10 years ago

- At the Annual Meeting I raised the issue of painting the view fences sometime in the next fiscal year, which begins July 1, 2008. During the month, the Board was busy responding to resident concerns about this project and obtaining more information on timing, need and method. Initially, however, the Board again researched the issue of responsibility and found that both the old and new C,C&R's expressly hold the Association responsible for the maintenance and repairs of the wrought iron fences in the community (Article 5.4 in the new documents). Some members suggested they would like to take care of this obligation themselves, but it does not appear the legal documents that we are bound to follow allow the Board to defer this responsibility to the residents.--Chuck Roach
- Regarding the issue of timing, we sought guidance from the gardening community and were advised that the best time to trim most plants, particularly those that may be frost tender, is in the transition period between winter and spring. Accordingly, our planning efforts will focus on early March 2009. Prior to moving forward with the project, we will provide specific locations and dates when the painters expect to be in each area to minimize any possible inconvenience to our residents.--Chuck Roach

- Pool Deck Resurfacing. The new "cool deck" resurfacing and resealing of the pool deck has been completed and is certainly a major improvement and enhancement over its previous condition. Additional Stop Signs. The Board accepted and approved the recommendation of the Security Committee to install additional Stop Signs in the Bellasera Community. The "T" intersection where Ponte Bella Drive coming from the Main Gate meets Corva Drive will become a 3-way stop. Several other connector streets that dead end onto the busier through streets will also get a new Stop Sign.
- Tennis Courts – Solutions. Our remaining two tennis courts are subject to continual cracking and ongoing maintenance issues. These problems are the direct result of a deficient subsurface preparation when the courts were originally installed 15 years ago. The two courts were resurfaced just last year, but new hairline cracks reappeared in short order. While these new cracks have now been repaired at no additional cost to the Association under the warranty from our contractor, a more permanent and cost-effective solution is warranted.
- Our May Potluck Dinner was fabulous fun, attended by 36 residents and graciously hosted by Lena and Larry Junker. Our plans for the June 7 potluck will have to be cancelled because a host team was not available for that date. The next potluck dinner will be on Friday, July 12 (note the date), and will be hosted by Karen and Jerry Meiliken. See you then.

June in the Garden

Summer Is Around The Corner!

May turned out to be a somewhat delightful month for us as temperatures stayed pretty close to the norms along with very pleasant evenings. And, as a bonus, we even had a welcome ¼ inch of rain. All in all, a good transition into June which is predictably hot and dry with lots of days over 100°F and a few as high as 110°F or more—and often not a drop of moisture. These conditions will provide a variety of **garden challenges** and **tasks** for you, mostly related to the heat and, as always, some **planting opportunities**.

Garden Challenges

During June in the low desert, plants must endure the intense heat throughout the day. Many of our native and desert-adapted plants have numerous adaptations that enable them to live successfully, such as succulence, drought-deciduousness and small leaves, to name a few examples. Even with these numerous adaptations, desert plants sometimes need a little help to keep them healthy and thriving in your garden which leads to your biggest and most important challenge, be aware and responsive to:

Watering Guidelines

Always the number #1 challenge, proper irrigation to your plants is crucial during the summer months, especially June, as it is normally the driest month of the year. As the temperatures rise, plant watering needs will also increase. Now is the time to **adjust your watering schedule for the summer**.

Watering guidelines can be complicated as the amount of water and watering frequency depends on many factors such as:

•Soil Type •Weather (temperature, humidity, rainfall, etc.) •Microclimate •Plant Size and Species •Newly planted or established in the landscape (two years or more).

There is no simple answer, but let's go with our reliable, **simple guidelines**:

How Much?

Ensure that you are deep watering your landscape plants to prevent salt build-up.

Use a soil probe or a long-handled screw-driver to determine how deeply water is penetrating.

A simple guideline is the **1-2-3 Rule**:

1 foot deep for small, shallow rooted plants.

2 feet deep for shrubs.

3 feet deep for trees.

How Often?

An often asked question and, in addition to the irrigation guidelines below, it is important to take into consideration weather, soil conditions, plant maturity and how well the plant has adapted to the desert. **Remember-** let soil dry between watering's.

7-21 days - Desert-adapted trees

7-14 days - Non-Desert adapted trees

7-21 days - Desert shrubs

5-7 days - Non-Desert adapted shrubs

Other considerations:

•Recently planted **native or desert-adapted trees** should be watered once a week if temperatures are over 100 degrees. If temperatures are over 108 degrees water every 2-3 days.

•Natural rainfall may be adequate for most well-established **cacti** and **succulents**. However, if rainfall is insufficient; water may be needed at least once for cactus and twice for succulents during the month of June. Always allow soil to dry out between each irrigation cycle. Water your cacti and succulents to a depth of at least 8-12 inches.

Ineffective water management is the number one cause of death of landscape plants in the Valley, and, believe it or not, it is more frequently from over watering than under watering. You can reduce your water bill and take better care of your plants if you water **slowly** (prevents run off), **deeply** and **infrequently** (let the soil dry between watering).

Monitor for Heat Stress

In addition to providing proper irrigation to your plants during the summer months, observe plants regularly for signs of water stress. You need to occasionally walk around your property to look for those signs which include: *wilting, curling leaves, yellowing or falling of older leaves, and dead stems or branches*. Some plants with larger leaves like

Sacred Datura and Queen's Wreath will often wilt during the hottest part of the day, but by next morning they usually recover. However, if they do not recover by the following morning, it is a good indication they need to be watered.

What to Plant

The ideal time for planting is fall or spring. However, here in the Sonoran Desert, a month never goes by without there being an opportunity to plant something. So, for June, an ideal candidate to consider is **herbs**. Others are, **warm-season vines**, **native and desert-adapted trees** and, as always, **warm season veggies**.

Warning: if you have a need to plant during the summer months, watering may need to be more frequent and you must be diligent about observing your newly planted plants for signs of water stress.

Herbs

You'll find a good variety at all of the grocery stores in small pots and inexpensive (\$3-

\$4). You should consider:

- Oregano
- Thyme
- Mint
- Parsley
- Sage
- Basil

You can transplant them to larger pots where they are easily maintained. If you like, set them on the ground and hook them up to your drip system. Fresh herbs grown and maintained by you are far superior to those found in local grocery store. For **Rosemary**, I would recommend planting in the ground as they do very well here in Bellasera.

Warm-Season Vines

Many varieties (e.g. **Yellow Orchid-vine**, **Queen's Wreath**, **Yellow Morning Glory-vine**) can be planted during the summer months. Water immediately after planting and monitor the moisture for the next few days to keep the root ball from drying out. Water newly planted native and desert-adapted vines twice to three times weekly to a depth of at least a foot. Gradually extend the time between watering and monitor plants regularly for signs of water stress.

Warm-Season Veggies (Heat-Loving Edibles)

Sow seeds for Armenian cucumbers, basil, black-eyed peas, cantaloupe and okra.

Transplant sweet potato slips; lush sweet potato foliage produces pretty flowers and spreads widely, like a groundcover in the garden.

Native and Desert-Adapted Trees-

After planting your trees, they should be watered immediately and the moisture monitored for the next few days to keep the root ball from drying out. Newly planted native and desert-adapted trees may need to be watered more frequently until established. It can take up to 3-5 years for trees to become established in the landscape.

Maintenance Tasks

Roses- Cut back on fertilizing established roses to encourage plants to slow down for the hot summer. Water deeply as temperatures climb and hose off plants in the early morning to increase humidity and control spider mites.

Mulch Landscape Plants- Apply mulch to soil surfaces of trees, shrubs and flowerbeds to keep root zones cooler and minimize loss of water through evaporation. Mulch can be inorganic (gravel, fabric) or organic (wood chips, pine bark or needles, chopped leaves).

Citrus- Fruit drop should be finished by this month and new fruits should be forming. If you didn't do so last month, fertilize. The next time is August/September prior to fruit sizing time.

Palms- Prune palms when flower spathes show or delay pruning until after the palm has finished flowering to prevent infestation of Palm Flower caterpillars. If palms are pruned in the spring, leave the top five rows of peels so the caterpillars have a place to hide. Cut off spent blooms to stimulate rebloom.

Fertilization – Do not fertilizing your desert-adapted landscape plants during the summer months. Fertilizing will cause excessive, luxuriant growth that requires more water and new growth is too tender to take the excessive heat and sun exposure. Wait until next spring to fertilize, if needed.

Plants in containers- These plants should be watered daily, preferably early in the morning. Be sure the water flows out the bottom of the pot with each watering.

Did You Know

Many of the leguminous trees and shrubs are producing their fruits or pods. Some are edible while others are not and can be quite toxic like the Texas Mountain Laurel. However, fruits of our native Mesquites such as Velvet Mesquite, Honey Mesquite and Screwbean Mesquite are often prepared to produce flour which can be used in a variety of recipes. If you do not harvest your mesquite pods, allow the pods to fall and remain on the ground for desert animals to eat as they are a vital food resource. It might even help distract them from eating your most prized plants.
