

I spent two days in HonorHealth Thompson Peak Hospital Intensive Care Unit. The protocol is get blood tests, and then monitor the anti-venom repercussions. They took measurements to watch for swelling at the ankle, calf, and thigh to avoid issues leading up to the heart.



#### BELLASERA RULES REMINDERS

#### **Bellasera Home Exterior Garage Door Lighting Specifications:**

The following are the specifications for 'under eaves' lighting for the exterior of your home: LED Soft White Bulbs, 9 Watt (65 Watt equivalent), 650 to 800 lumens, 2700 light appearance, either "indoor" or "indoor/outdoor" bulbs should work satisfactorily, assuming the bulb is protected under the eave. For clarification or additional information, please contact the Community Manager.

All exterior improvements to a home (including but not limited to site work, exterior alteration of existing improvements, artwork displayed on the exterior surface of any residence or in the front yard, fences, signs, antennae, playground equipment, lighting, fences, solar panels, and landscaping) must be in accordance with Bellasera's Design Guidelines and approved by the Modifications Committee prior to the commencement of work. Design Guidelines, modifications applications and submittal procedures are available on our website.

Any condition that exists on a residential property which does not strictly comply with the Design Guidelines will be treated as a violation in accordance with our Violation Policy available on our website.

One "security" sign, measuring no greater than 100 square inches, no higher than 18 inches tall and placed no more than 2 feet from the foundation of the home may be installed in the front yard of a residence.

Open House Signs shall not exceed 18 x 24 inches and a sign rider shall not exceed 6 x 24 inches. Open House hours are limited to between 8:00AM and 6:00PM.

For Sale or For Lease signs, shall not exceed  $18 \times 24$  inches and a sign rider shall not exceed  $6 \times 24$  inches.

For Sale, For Lease, Open House signs or directional signs of any kind are prohibited on common area.

Political Signs may be displayed no earlier than 45 days prior to an election nor later than 7 days after an election day on an Owner's property. Signs shall not exceed 16 square feet.

# April In the Garden

## Spring Is Here, As Beautiful As Ever! Clocks Spring Forward, Sun Shifts Northward

For most of the country, changing of the clocks is a hopeful step closer to spring. Here in the Sonoran Desert, there is no reason to hope because we are usually well on our way to being awash in color by April. The adage that spring in the Sonoran Desert can be a four-month-long spectacle of life and color is clearly demonstrated in our community that one seems

never to tire of. Deserts are not as bereft of life as they seem; their barren landscapes can support a remarkable variety of plant and animal life. We are surrounded by all of this.

#### **A Perfect Spring**

March was a great transition to spring with moderate daytime temperatures (with some above average highs), cool evenings and some rain. We still have ideal conditions for **planting** as well as some **pruning** and other **miscellaneous tasks** which are covered below.

#### **Planting**

Although your summer planting should be underway, you still have time to add some additional life to your garden. Just remember to choose native plants or plants that are adapted to our high temperatures and alkaline soils. This is a good month for transplanting as you should beat the heat and have them in the ground before temperatures climb beyond 100 degrees. Some suggestions:

- Tropical Plants like Bougainvillea and Lantana.
- **Desert-Adapted** trees, shrubs, groundcovers, vines, ornamental grasses, perennials, cacti and succulents.
- Citrus Trees Remember, dwarf only and they need to be in the rear of your property.
- Herbs Transplant warm-season favorites, including basil, lavender, rosemary and sage.
- Warm-Season Veggies Sow seeds for black-eyed peas, cantaloupe, cucumbers, jicama, lima beans, okra, peanuts and summer squashes, such as crookneck, pattypan and zucchini.

#### **Warm Season Annual Flowers**

I covered this last month and, as the weather continues to warm, your winter annuals will decline rapidly (stop flowering) and need to be replaced with warm season annuals. So, when you give up on them, nurseries will have great choices. Some suggestions are:

- Celosia Gaillardia Globe amaranth Portulaca Gazania Zinia Verbina
- Lisianthus Madagascar periwinkle Marigold -Petunia

#### Pruning

As emphasized last month, pruning should be done to maintain plant health (remove dead, damaged or diseased portions, cross branching, etc.), to highlight the "natural" shape of the plant, to train a young plant, and to eliminate hazards. With this in mind, April is a good month for pruning as follows:

- Continue to prune evergreen trees.
- Lightly prune your Mesquites and Palo Verdes after bud break or after flowering.
- Pruning newly planted trees and shrubs is **not recommended** and in fact can be detrimental. However, corrective pruning of broken or torn branches and/or limbs can be done at planting time. Save other pruning activities for the second or third year.

- Continue to prune summer and fall flowering shrubs by mid-month including:
  - -Texas Sages -Yellow Bells -Lantana -Turpentine Bush -Mexican-honeysuckle - Sky Flower - Black Dalea
- **Rosemary** Spring growth should be well underway and, following the blossoming (which should be almost over) of its vivid blue-violet flowers, can be safely trimmed back.
- Cactus If *cholla* or *prickley pear* cactus become too large, they should be cut to a joint with a saw or large clippers.

#### **Monthly Garden Tasks**

**Roses** - During spring's peak bloom period feed and water to promote continued flowering. Apply fertilizer every two weeks until the heat of summer begins. Water twice per week when temperatures are below 80 degrees, increasing to three times weekly when temperatures are above 80 degrees or conditions are windy, which can dry out foliage and blooms.

Watering/Drip System - you need to clean out sediment and algae as well as replace clogged emitters and also clean filters. Adjust your drip system to water more frequently. How much? This is always one of the hardest questions to answer. Generally, be sure to run your system long enough to wet the top two feet of soil. Deep, infrequent (e.g. once per week) watering is much better than a daily sprinkle. Remember: annual flowers may require more.

**Feed Citrus** - Fertilize trees with their second feeding of the year this month or next. Apply one-third of the tree's total annual nitrogen requirement. Water deeply after spreading the fertilizer. **Weeding** - April and May are usually the worst months.

#### What's Blooming Now?

**Bougainvillea** has been blooming for the most of the winter and, right on schedule, is now undergoing a growth spurt which will add to their intensity and luster. In addition **Penstemon, Fairy Duster, Senna** and **Lantana** are coming into their own, adding to the

bouquet. It's the tip of the iceberg as a myriad of other "Bloomers" will quickly join the color parade. And, of course, we have our omnipresent *Desert Marigold* with its beautiful yellow flowers cropping up everywhere joined by *Desert Bursage* another native ground-cover that needs little water and provides nice color contrast. If you have **Citrus**, go outdoors at night and enjoy the unmistakable beautiful, unique fragrance of citrus in full bloom.
