Relax, restore and rejuvenate the body. The first part of class is spent in gentle, restorative poses using props such as blankets and blocks for comfort. Time is spent in each pose allowing gentle opening and deep relaxation in the body and mind. The second part of the class is spent in Yoga Nidra, a guided meditation technique. It is the easiest form of meditation since you are comfortably lying down and all you need to do is be there. Yoga Nidra quiets the mind, while boosting the energy flow in the body. The practice is known to promote healing within the body, aid in insomnia, stress, behavior patterns, and anxiety.

In addition to 500-level Yoga Alliance certification, **Joy** has completed over 100 hours in Yoga Nidra training and is certified in this specialization through the Amrit Yoga Institute.

Bellasera Rules Reminders

Business or trade activities within a residence is restricted to activities in which a) the activity is not apparent by sight, sound or smell outside of the residence; b) the activity conforms to all zoning requirements; c) the activity does not involve regular visitation of the residence by clients, customers or other business invitees; and d) the activity is consistent with the residential character of Bellasera and does not constitute a nuisance, hazardous or offensive use, or threaten security or safety of other residents.

Residents may keep a reasonable number of common household pets only, however, pets which make objectionable noise, endanger the health or safety of, or constitute a nuisance to others or roam free, unleashed will be considered in violation of the CC&Rs. Pet owners are required to remove and properly dispose of pet excrement within the community.

One "security" sign, measuring no greater than 100 square inches, no higher than 18 inches tall and placed no more than 2 feet from the foundation of the home may be installed in the front yard of a residence. Open House Signs shall not exceed 18 x 24 inches and a sign rider shall not exceed 6 x 24 inches. Open House hours are limited to between 8:00AM and 6:00PM. For Sale or For Lease signs, shall not exceed 18 x 24 inches and a sign rider shall not exceed 6 by 24 inches. For Sale, For Lease, Open House signs or directional signs of any kind are prohibited on common area. Political Signs may be displayed no earlier than 45 days prior to an election nor later than 7 days after an election day on an Owner's property. Signs shall not exceed 16 square feet.

February In the Garden

Winter in The Homestretch? Not Yet!

The sun's retreat to the north and longer days are supposed to be sure signs that winter is in the homestretch, especially for us living here in the desert. However, it looks like this year will be an exception as our chilly January temperatures, sans frost, will continue a little while longer into February.

A Perfect Weather Year? Probably!

It's in the eye of the beholder, but a perfect weather year in the Sonoran Desert is defined as receiving frequent low-intensity winter (December/ January) rains as well as violent summer (July/August) "monsoon" thunderstorms. These distinct rainy seasons support a broad array of warm

and cool-season flora and fauna, and are the primary cause of the amazing species and lifeform diversity of the Sonoran Desert. Our weather has closely followed this script and will not only benefit our beautiful surroundings but, more importantly, your garden.

Cleanup & Get Ready for Spring Planting

The growing season officially starts in mid-February for us and, given the cool weather projections, I would not recommend starting before then. However, be prompt as we need to give plants and trees a chance to grow before the punishing summer heat.

I suggest you take the following steps:

- Survey your garden for areas that might need to be or cleaned up rejuvenated.
- Identify now what you might consider planting this month.

Planting Suggestions

Landscape Plants: You can continue to plant cold-hardy and fall-winter growers such as:

- Globe mallow Penstemons Brittlebush Blackfoot Golden Columbine
- Goodding's Verbena Red Justicia Fragrant Evening Primrose
- Desert Milkweed Trixis Cleveland Sage White Sage Aloes

Agaves: When sprucing up your garden this spring, you should consider agaves. They are typically native to Mexico but many grow very well here and will give instant drama to your landscape. The agave is a succulent with rigid stiff leaves that form a rosette shape and, if you look carefully at the underside of the leaf, you will see an impression of another leaf. There are about 20 varieties to choose from which can be found at your local nursery such as:

- •American century plant (Agave Americana) •Foxtail Americana (Agave attenua)
- Parryi's agave (Agave parryii) Queen Victoria agave (Agave victoriae-reginae)

Purple Lilac Vine (Hardenbergia Violacea): This evergreen vine is native to Australia where it is most frequently spotted scrambling over rocky banks, using any neighboring trees and shrubs for upward support. Here in Southwestern U.S., Purple Lilac Vine is more cultivated and tame, often supported by trellises or a block wall. And, more importantly, it waits until the dead of winter to produce its purple lilac-shaped flowers.





Valentine's Day Considerations: If you are at all influenced by this wonderful occasion think about planting:

Roses: I'll repeat my recommendation of the last few months to consider planting either *bare root* or *container grown* roses. There is a wide variety still available in local nurseries. Also, this is a perfect month to address maintenance of your roses (see on page 9).

Emu Bush: The *Eremophila Maculata* or 'Valentine" can be looked at as a long-lasting Valentine "bouquet". It is covered in tubular flowers beloved by hummingbirds from January through March. Flower buds start out red and then open fully to hot pink. In cold weather, foliage displays an unusual reddish-purplish hue.

February Pruning

Frost Considerations- Although we have not had any serious frost so far this season, do not prune frost sensitive plants until the last chance for freezing conditions has past, which is usually around mid-February to early March. Suggested pruning guidelines for February:



Deciduous trees- Finish pruning nonnative deciduous shade trees and deciduous fruit trees by midmonth.

Citrus trees- Prune frost sensitive citrus after they begin to leaf out, if needed. As a general rule, citrus needs to be pruned only if there are aberrant branches ruining the shape of the tree.

Succulents- As a general rule, if plants have frost damage, resist the urge to prune affected stems until the weather warms next month. The only exception is flowering stalks on aloes, which can be removed anytime.

Flowering annuals and perennials- Continue to deadhead to encourage additional blooms.

Remember: Have a purpose and an end result in mind before you make the first cut. Never remove more than 1/4 of the total plant. Always use sharp, sterile, quality pruning tools and disinfect them between cuts to prevent the spread of disease. Pruning is an art as well as a science. How much you cut off and where you choose to make the cuts will affect both the health and the beauty of the plant or tree.

Miscellaneous Garden Tasks

Watering— Your irrigation timer should have been turned off this past month and you should manually trigger a cycle later in the month only if rainfall is insufficient.

Maintain Roses- Finish pruning by mid-month. Rake up and dispose of leaf litter around shrubs, as it may harbor powdery mildew. Apply fresh mulch. Start fertilizing when new growth is about 2 inches long. Continue feeding every 6 weeks in preparation for April's major bloom fest.

Fertilize Fruit Trees- If you did not do so in January, feed citrus with one-third of the tree's annual nitrogen requirement.

Vegetable Garden

If you have the ambition and energy to grow vegetables, considering the rainfall we've had, this an excellent month to prepare a new vegetable garden.

Vegetable seeds to sow **now** include:

- beets bok choy carrots collard greens lentils leaf lettuce mustard greens
- green onions Irish potatoes radishes turnips

Vegetable seeds to sow the **second part of February** include:

- sweet corn cantaloupe cucumbers muskmelon summer squash watermelon Vegetable Transplants include:
 - •Artichokes (Globe & Jerusalem) Asparagus Chard Kohlrabi Lettuce,
 - Onion SetsPeppersTomatoes
