It's Official: Annual Meeting Date Set

The Board has finally determined that this year's Annual Meeting of Bellasera homeowners will be held on **Sunday April 24** at **2:00 p.m**. on the patio at the clubhouse. We look forward to seeing you there.

Each homeowner should have received a mailing which includes the formal notice of the Annual Meeting date, together with a Candidate Application Form for those who wish to be included on the election ballot for the open Board of Directors positions. Applications to run as a candidate for an open Board seat are due by **Wednesday, March 23**. This year there will be four open positions on the Board of Directors, three (3) for two-year terms, and one (1) for a one-year term. The Board decided against adopting an on-line voting option as one of the choices to vote. We will continue to use the customary paper ballots which will be sent out in a subsequent mailing.

More Tire Tracks in Washes

We continue to see new tire tracks from off-road vehicles or motorcycles in our washes. While we cannot be certain, this is most likely the result of actions from someone from outside Bellasera. Driving or using any motorized vehicle (motorcycle, ATV, etc.) is prohibited and, in addition to leaving unsightly tracks, can harm our desert landscape and plants. We have posted new "No Trespassing" signs at several locations to discourage such activity. Please, if you notice any such activity, report it to the Community Manager or a Board member.

Bellasera Rules Reminders

Violation Enforcement Policy

"Friendly Reminder" In most cases, and when appropriate as determined by the Association Manager or the Board, the first notification to an Owner of their violation of the Declaration, the Governing Documents and/or a Rule will be by means of a "friendly reminder" letter. The Association Manager will issue the letter.

"Notice of Violation" - If within fifteen (15) days of the date of the "Friendly Reminder" compliance is not gained, a written "Notice of Violation(s)" together with a request to cease and desist from an alleged violation(s) may be sent to the Owner of the Lot via regular mail and shall specify the relevant facts relating to the violation.

If the Owner is leasing his/her home, the Association -will provide a copy of the Notice of Violation(s) to the Owner's tenant as well as the Home Owner- The Board may deviate from any guidelines herein based on the application of the factors contained in paragraph VI below.

VI. Imposition of Fine and any other Sanctions.

- (a) Fines. At the conclusion of the hearing, the Owner may be excused from the hearing and the Board of Directors shall deliberate on the amount of the fine to be imposed, if any, based on:
- -The seriousness of the violation(s).
- -Whether this is a first violation or a continuing violation(s).
- -Whether the type of offense poses a danger to property or any person and other extenuating circumstances and whether the Owner agrees in good faith to correct the violation(s) within the time specified by the Board of Directors.
- -Whether the amount is sufficient to obtain compliance, based on the facts.
- -Impact on property values.
- -After the Board of Directors determines the amount of the fine, the Board of Directors shall send notice to the Owner of the amount of the fine and its due date.
- -The Board of Directors is empowered to impose a fine for each day that the violation(s) continues.

Mistletoe in the Desert



Desert Mistletoe is a parasite that affects plants in our area of the valley, especially around Bellasera and especially in Mesquite and Palo Verde trees. Although it is almost impossible to eliminate completely, you can and should control its spread in your trees. Eventually it can kill the trees as is evident in the NAOS area along Lone Mountain Road. The following is an article by Chief Meteorologist **Royal Norman** of 3TV news dated January 12, 2021 and gives some interesting information.

It's a little late for mistletoe, but not too late to tell a fuller story about the well-known but sort of notorious plant. I sent out a tweet around Christmas when I was hiking around the desert and posted a picture of mistletoe. Yes, it grows in the desert.

All the quaint old tales of kissing under the mistletoe aside, the plant is parasitic. It lives off the tree where it hangs. There are 1,500 varieties in the world and in the Sonoran desert, the most common type is Phoradendron californicum. Yes, I had to look that up. Sometimes called the mesquite mistletoe, it's scientifically termed a hemiparasitic and is native to Southern California, Nevada, Arizona and northern Mexico in elevations up to 4,600 feet.

Hemiparasitic is a fancy word meaning while the plant does take nutrients from the tree it attaches to, it also does its own photosynthesis. OK, I'm done with all the big words, how about some pictures? Once I started looking for it, I found a fair

amount on my 3-mile route.

Here's a little one in a Palo Verde tree and it kind of looks like the cold, morning weather may have been taking a toll on the mistletoe. Sadly, this clump of mistletoe seems to be getting the most of this Palo Verde tree.

I will say that even though I saw more mistletoe than I ex-

pected once I started looking for it, where I was hiking, I saw it in only a very small percentage of the trees.

March In the Garden

A Late Winter Storm, But Signs Of Spring Are Here!

In spite of the late winter storm which brought us some welcome rain, February did provided a prelude to spring. We experienced seasonal temperatures with both chilly and a warm stretches which were perfectly timed for the fans and sponsors of our local WM Golf Tournament. It was a rather pleasant month as we get ready to welcome spring. Although we didn't get much total rain in January or February, the record rainfall in December has left your gardens still receptive for spring planting and renovation. *March is normally a great month for*

gardening in the desert!

Your Garden Is Starting To Come Alive!

Take a look at any of your landscape plants and you'll see:

Minimal Frost Damage- Our landscape plants have experienced very little frost damage as evidenced by the flowering perennials such as bougainvillea, lantana and honeysuckle which continue to sparkle. Of course, there are always exceptions depending on the plant location.

New Growth- landscape plants are beginning to come alive as you'll see plenty of new growth especially those with a southern exposure. **Citrus** are starting to bud out along new leaf sprouts.

Mesquite Trees- We have a variety of mesquite here in Bellasera and they are quickly losing their leaves at various rates depending on species and exposure. You will find new leaf growth already on some, especially velvet mesquite.

What To Plant

March is a terrific month for adding most plant types to our low-desert landscapes. Warming soil temperatures will enhance seed germination and root development before the arrival of summer's intense heat. You can *transplant*:

• trees •shrubs • vines • groundcovers • perennials • ornamental grasses • cacti

Choose a few plants that will bloom almost year-round (if no freeze), such as: *Baja Red Fairy Duster, Mexican Honeysuckle* and *Orange Bells*.

Annual Flowers

When your winter-growing annuals start to decline, consider replacing them with warm season annuals such as: • *Celosia* • *Gaillardia* • *Globe Amaranth* • *Portulaca* • *Marigold*

Citrus Trees

They grow well in our community and, if you have none and want to give it a try, this an ideal time as a wide variety is available in our local nurseries. You should be able to choose from:

- Grapefruits •Lemons/Limes Sweet oranges such as Mars, Trovita or Valencia.
- Pummelo(sweet mild grapefruit) hybrids such as Melogold or Oroblanco

Remember, in Bellasera, only dwarf varieties are allowed in your backyard.

Cactus

You can plant all types of cacti and succulents this month. In addition to purchasing them from a nursery, they can be easily propagated from existing plants via *cuttings* or *offshoots*.

Herbs

How about an herb garden to perk up your cooking? Try favorites such as:

• Basil • Chives • Marjoram • Mint • Oregano • Parsley • Sage

Most of these can be purchased in the local grocery stores in small pots (for about \$6.00) and can be easily transplanted in the ground or a larger pot.

Pruning

<u>Shrubs, Groundcovers and Vines</u>- Since there is no threat of frost, March is the perfect time to prune these. Specifically, you should pay attention to Summer and fall flowering shrubs including:

- Texas Sages Yellow Bells Lantana Turpentine Bush
- Black Dalea Mexican-honeysuckle Sky Flower

Warm-season herbaceous perennials(that have no persistent woody stem above ground), groundcovers and vines including:

- Chocolate Flower Plumbago Mexican Hat Gaura
- Queen's Wreath
 Mealy-cup Sage
 Rock Verbena
 Trailing
 Lantana
 Dyssodia
 Passion Vines
 Yellow Orchid-vine

Prune by cutting back to emerging growth or to the basal rosette (group of leaves arranged from a central point).

<u>Cactus</u>- Wait to prune your *prickly-pears* and *chollas* until after flowering.

Spent stalks of aloes, agaves and other succulents can be removed at this time.

Rosemary- They are in a growth spurt and blooming. Do not prune until they are finished blooming. **Note:** If you need to rejuvenate older or overly large shrubs (e.g. Texas Sage as shown above), cut all stems about 12-18 inches above the ground. This is a severe measure and changes the appearance drastically. However, when done in spring before bud burst, a great proliferation of stems will grow just below each cut by mid-summer (as shown below).





Miscellaneous

<u>Fertilization</u>- Now is the time to fertilize your warm-season cacti, succulents, herbaceous and woody perennials, and annuals in containers. Periodic fertilization may be needed for plants in containers as nutrients will have diminished in the soil over time. Depending on the type of fertilizer used, follow directions on the label.

Roses- Continue feeding roses every six weeks to prepare them for spring's peak bloom. Spread fresh mulch to maintain consistent soil moisture, making sure mulch does not touch their stems.

<u>Drip System</u>- As temperatures rise during the month of March, turn on your irrigation timer, test the timer to see if it is working properly and replace back-up batteries if necessary
